

How to Grow Inula



Position – Full sun or part shade

Soil – Moist but well-drained

Flowering Period- Summer

Hardiness – Fully Hardy

Where to plant Inula



Inula are best planted in a moist but well-drained soil of clay or loam within an acidic, alkaline or neutral PH balance. They are best positioned in an area of full sun or part shade. Inula are well suited to flower beds and borders within a cottage or informal garden setting.

How to plant Inula



Inula need plenty of space to grow and can become invasive so take care when choosing an appropriate site.

How to care for Inula



Taller varieties may need staking in exposed areas. Ensure that the soil is kept moist, particularly in periods of drought. It may be useful to apply a layer of mulch to retain moisture levels and suppress weeds whilst supplementing the soil with additional nutrition. Once flowering has ended in autumn, cut back the stems to encourage further growth from varieties that should appear in the following season.

How to propagate Inula



It is possible to propagate Inula by division in autumn and spring or softwood cuttings or seed in the spring.
