



How to Grow Podophyllum

Position – Full sun or part shade
Soil – Moist, well-drained
Flowering Period – Summer
Hardiness – Hardy

About Podophyllum

Podophyllum are rhizomatous perennials with intriguing foliage, often produced in varying shapes and sizes, however all thick and textured, with prominent veins and mottled shades of greens, yellows and browns. Flowers will follow in summer by cup or bell-shaped flowers, along with red or yellow fruit. Podophyllum are best suited to flower beds and borders within an architectural, courtyard and cottage garden setting. You should expect to see your plants grow to an approximate height and spread of 10-50cm (4-20").

How to plant Podophyllum

Podophyllum are best planted in moist, well-drained soil of clay and loam within an acidic or neutral PH balance. Enrich the planting area with a generous amount of compost. Plant your Podophyllum so that the top of the crown is roughly 1-2 inches below soil level. Leave a gap of around 50cm (20") between each planting and water thoroughly once in place to settle the soil. Site your plants in an area that will attract full sun or part shade.

How to care for Podophyllum

Water Podophyllum regularly during its first few weeks to help with its establishment. Provide a generous amount of mulch in the spring and autumn to retain moisture levels and to suppress weeds.

How to propagate Podophyllum

It is possible to propagate Podophyllum by division during the spring or late summer.
